Grandpa Petter and wife, Anna  
Stina were married about 1863—  
They had 3 sons named Gust—their  
first-born, Gust, died at 5 months.  
Then came Anna, 1867—Ida, 1872—  
Carl, 1872—Kristin, 1874, our Mother,  
Katrín, 1880 ~ Gust, born 1882. Baby  
Gust was lying in his cradle and she  
(Mother) loved him so and wanted to  
play with him—in her ardor she stooped  
down and bit his toe. Not very long  
afterward he developed an illness and  
died at 6 mos. 17 days, but for some time  
Mother thought she was the cause of his  
death, because she had bitten his toe. This  
was Mother's first and very early recollection  
of grief. Then in 1885, the Gust we know was  
born and last was Anders, 1886, of whom I have  
already told you.



Aunt Anna and Ida were married and raising their  
own families when Mother was in her teens. Anna, with  
her four oldest, Gustav, Anna, Oscar & Thora, lived upstairs  
in the family home while Anna's husband, Petter was off to  
make a home for them in the United States. Later, he came  
for them, but while they were at home, Master Katrin stayed  
with the children many hours because Anna did like to  
flit around a bit. They settled in Worcester, Mass.

Ida and her husband, Petter, lived nearby—they were  
blessed with 11 children, one of whom is the Hedvig we  
know in Chicago. The children often stayed at Mother's  
home so they wouldn't have so far to walk to school in the  
bad weather. Hedvig writes again — "As I very often  
stayed at Grandma's I saw her (Katrín) very much during  
my early childhood. I saw her at work in the fields, in  
the barn milking cows and at the loom. One evening at milk-  
ing time a wanderer stopped by the barn. He carried a canary  
in a cage all covered up. It looked mysterious. He talked to  
Master and Grandma a bit and finally asked if he could spend
